About the Cover:

The most architecturally distinctive building on the Horseshoe, the South Caroliniana Library, built in 1840, was the first free-standing college library in the nation. It is probably the only building on the Horseshoe that has closely maintained its original interior appearance, although a more modern decor has replaced the nineteenth-century utilitarian colors. The first library building was assigned to house only material pertaining to South Carolina, and was renamed South Caroliniana Library when McKissick Memorial Library was completed in 1940.

History of the University of South Carolina

Chartered in 1801 as South Carolina College, the University of South Carolina was the first state university to be supported continuously by annual state appropriations. In the years before the Civil War, it rapidly achieved a reputation for academic excellence in the classical tradition and was known as one of the best endowed and most distinguished colleges in the United States. Its faculty included Francis Lieber, editor of the *Encyclopedia Americana* and author of *Civil Liberty and Self Government*, the nationally known scientists John and Joseph LeConte, and chemist William Eller, who produced the first daguerreotype in the United States. By the 1830s, distinguished alumni almost literally filled the state's General Assembly. James H. Hammond and Wade Hampton were the most prominent of a parade of future governors, senators, judges, and generals who graduated during the ante-bellum period.

The pre-Civil War campus included Longstreet Theatre and all the buildings in the area known today as the Horseshoe (with the exception of McKissick Museum). When the voluntary enlistment of all students into the Army of the Confederacy forced the College to close in June of 1862, the buildings were used by the Confederate government as a hospital. By the time Sherman's army reached Columbia in February of 1865, the hospital contained wounded Union soldiers. A fire soon started that destroyed most of the city, but federal troops helped save the campus buildings from the flames.

After re-opening in 1865, the institution went through six reorganizations and name changes during the last decades of the 19th century, while legislators, administrators and faculties reassessed the institution's goals and struggled to define its mission. Finally in 1906, at the beginning of its second century, it was rechartered for the third, and last, time as the University of South Carolina, with a graduate school.

In sharp contrast to the South Carolina College's ante-bellum, elitist philosophy, President William Davis Melton in 1925 expressed a far-reaching principle that had emerged in first quarter of the century: "Education is not a special privilege

to be enjoyed by a special few.” Thus, in its final reorganization, the University of South Carolina developed this institutional objective-- to furnish both liberal and professional education to the people of South Carolina.

Efforts to achieve that objective were almost immediately hampered by the early arrival of the Great Depression in South Carolina. Enrollment declined, some courses were eliminated, and buildings went without repairs. The situation improved greatly in the late 1930s because of grants from federal New Deal agencies. Then America entered World War II, and the campus was virtually transformed into a naval training base with payments from the Navy helping the school continue to function during the war years.

Fulfillment of the promise of the early years of the twentieth century began in earnest in the 1950s. Since then, dynamic academic expansion and the development of a state-wide network of campuses have produced highly diverse and innovative education programs. A commitment to graduate education along with involvement in major research programs has attracted an outstanding faculty to the University of South Carolina. An intense building program resulted in the construction of excellent modern physical facilities, as well as the preservation of Carolina’s traditional buildings.

University of South Carolina

Mission Statement

The primary mission of the University of South Carolina, a multi-campus system serving the entire State of South Carolina, is the education of the state's diverse citizens through teaching, research, creative activity, and service.

Teaching

The University is committed to providing its students with the highest-quality education, including the knowledge, skills, and values necessary for success and responsible citizenship in a complex and changing world. A particular strength of an education at the University of South Carolina is the excellence, breadth, and diversity of the institution's faculty.

Research

Convinced that research and scholarship, including artistic creation, are essential for excellent teaching, the University pursues aggressively an active research and scholarship program. The University is dedicated to using research to improve the quality of life for South Carolinians.

Service

Another important facet of the University's public mission is service-to its community, state, nation, and the world in such areas as public health, education, social issues, economic development, and family support systems.

Founded in 1801 in Columbia, the University of South Carolina began providing programs in communities statewide in the 1950's and 1960's. At that time, a network of campuses was established in response to community initiative and support for accessible, affordable educational programs principally for local citizens. In the 1970's, the Aiken and Spartanburg senior campuses were granted the authority to award baccalaureate degrees. While the regional campuses, the senior campuses, and the Columbia campus all pursue teaching, research, creative activity, and service, they do so with an emphasis suited to their individual campus missions.

Columbia Campus

As a major teaching and research institution, USC Columbia has long offered a comprehensive range of undergraduate and graduate programs through the doctoral level. With a mission of teaching, research, and service, USC Columbia addresses the state's needs for master's level, professional, doctoral education, for conducting and sharing research, and for responding to statewide and regional demands for educational resources and professional expertise.

USC Columbia aspires to national and international stature as it provides equitable access to its opportunities, resources, and activities.

Senior Campuses

Separately accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, Aiken and Spartanburg take as their primary mission the delivery of basic undergraduate education to their respective service areas. These senior campuses also offer graduate-level coursework through the University's Graduate Regional Studies program and sometimes offer master's degree programs in response to regional demand.

Regional Campuses

Accredited with USC Columbia by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the regional campuses in Beaufort, Lancaster, Allendale (Salkehatchie), Sumter, and Union principally provide the first two years of undergraduate education, as well as selected associate degree programs mainly for their locale. The regional campuses also provide for the completion of bachelor degrees by offering selected upper-division coursework in conjunction with Aiken, Columbia and Spartanburg campuses as well as some graduate education through the University's Graduate Regional Studies program. In addition to providing these programs, the regional campuses bring the resources of the entire University system to citizens throughout the state.

USC Columbia Mission Statement

USC Columbia's professional programs in law, pharmacy, medicine, and the magnitude of its graduate programs in areas such as the arts and sciences, international business, public health, social work, and library and information science distinguish it from all other institutions of higher learning in the State of South Carolina. Additional opportunities for personal and career development, including an associate degree program at Fort Jackson, are provided to the citizens of South Carolina through outreach and continuing education activities. USC Columbia offers the most comprehensive array of educational programs in the state, and is the only South Carolina institution classified as a Four Year I by the Southern Regional Education Board.

Students at USC Columbia come from various backgrounds, with different career goals and levels of aspiration. The distinctiveness of USC Columbia lies in the conspicuous diversity that nurtures and stimulates students, faculty, and constituents. USC Columbia aspires to national and international stature as it provides equitable access to the full range of its opportunities, resources, and activities.

University Libraries

The library resources of the University of South Carolina are housed primarily in the Thomas Cooper Library, the Coleman Karesh Law Library of the School of Law, and the School of Medicine Library. The University of South Carolina holds membership in the Association of Research Libraries.

University Libraries

The components of the University Libraries which are located on the Columbia campus are Thomas Cooper Library, Business Administration Library, Mathematics Library, Music Library, and South Caroliniana Library.

The Thomas Cooper Library is a seven story structure near the geographic center of campus. The Library seats 2,400 people, contains over 2,794,000 volumes, 3,716,800 microfilms, 1,000,000 manuscripts, 312,352 maps, 857,427 government documents and houses the University's special collections. The Library contains a Student Computer Lab, with over 200 IBM and Macintosh networked workstations, 900 locked faulty and graduate student study carrels, and 40 group study rooms.

The staff of the Thomas Cooper Library and its affiliated libraries is composed of 172 full-time and 4 part-time employees and supplemented by approximately 100 student assistants. Sixty-two of the full-time staff are librarians holding faculty positions with appropriate degrees in library science from accredited library schools.

University Libraries hold membership in the Southeastern Library Network, which provides online automated cataloging services and interlibrary lending. Other automated services include an online catalog (NOTIS), online circulation system (NOTIS), online acquisitions system (NOTIS), a CD-ROM network, and online reference service from a variety of vendors. The online catalog is available from off-campus locations.

Coleman Karesh Law Library

The Coleman Karesh Law Library, the largest law library in the state of South Carolina, is located in the Law Center. The Law Library is an integral part of the School of Law, reporting administratively to the Dean of the Law School. In addition to supporting the research and study of the University's law students and law faculty, the Law Library serves the legal research needs of other University students and faculty and the state's legal community and public.

The four-story facility houses a collection of over 300,000 volumes. The focus of the collection is primary and secondary American Law materials, but includes a growing collection of international law materials. The Law Library provides seating for over 600 researchers, including carrels, study rooms, and open table seating.

The Law Library staff consists of 19 full-time employees and 5 FTE of temporary and student employees. The ten librarians of the Law Library staff hold graduate degrees in library science. Four of the librarians also have legal training. The librarians, with the exception of the Director of the Law Library, are members of the Law Library Faculty. The Director of the Law Library is a member of the Law School Faculty.

The Law Library holds membership in the Southeastern Library Network for cataloging and interlibrary loan. The Law Library also participates in the University's automated NOTIS system, utilizing the online catalog, acquisitions and circulation modules.

School of Medicine Library

The School of Medicine Library is located approximately four miles from the main campus. It is an integral part of the School of Medicine which is adjacent to the Veteran's Administration Hospital on Garners Ferry Road. In addition to serving the School of Medicine, the Medical Library is an information resource for health care practitioners throughout the state.

The School of Medicine Library contains over 93,000 volumes of highly specialized material relating to medicine and subscribes to over 1,200 periodicals.

The Library staff is composed of 15 full-time employees, six of whom are librarians who hold faculty positions and possess appropriate graduate degrees in library science. The Medical Library Faculty are tenure-track members of the School of Medicine Faculty.

The School of Medicine Library holds membership in the Southeastern Library Network for cataloging and interlibrary loan. The Medical Library participates in the University's automated NOTIS system.
